# Baseline status of the Program Models implemented through Life Stage wise interventions by the Local Partners with ChildFund India Terms of Reference

# 1. About the organization:

Centre for Youth and Social Development (CYSD), a non-government and non-profit organization, has been working towards improving the quality of lives of tribal and rural poor in Odisha, with primary focus on eradicating extreme poverty and hunger, ensuring social inclusion and justice, good governance and citizen's right, helping communities identify and initiate development measures, providing training and other capacity-building support to pro-poor organizations and individuals, and carrying out research and advocacy in favour of the under privileged people especially the tribals. CYSD also joins hands with the special initiatives taken up by the government, civil society and communities to address inequality both in number and intensity.

CYSD has carved out four coherent and reinforcing strategic actions to realize its mission which include: Promoting Sustainable Livelihoods; Fostering Participatory Governance; Reducing disaster vulnerability and addressing climate change concerns; and Advocating for Responsive State. Basically a three-pronged approach is followed for implementation of different programmes; such as: i) Action and Learning through intensive participatory action and experimentation at the community level; ii) Replication/ Scaling up through extensive partnership and networking with like-minded agencies; and iii) Policy Influencing at State and National level through policy research and advocacy.

#### 2. Partnership with ChildFund India:

Safeguarding the rights of the children has been an overarching component in CYSD's strategic programme direction in line with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). CYSD in partnership with ChildFund India has been implementing its programmatic interventions with an integrated approach focusing on child protection, education, health and livelihoods. Further, child being the centre, complete life-cycle approach is followed until completion of 24 years of age. CYSD has been working towards increased protection, and effective redressal of all forms of abuse, neglect, exploitation and violence against children, especially girls in its operational areas emphasizing on the Rights of the children along with overall improvement of health, education and economic improvement of the households. The interventions have been in operation in 165 targeted villages of 18 Gram Panchayats (GPs), in 5 blocks of Malkangiri and Rayagada districts in Odisha since July, 2017.

The other partners including Bastar Sewak Mandal, Centre for World Solidarity (CWS), Child In Need Institute (CINI), Chetna Vikas, Regional Centre for Development Cooperation (RCDC), South Orissa Voluntary Action (SOVA) and Voluntary Association for Rural Reconstruction & Appropriate Technology (VARRAT) are also implementing such programmes in the East Zone with the support from ChildFund India.

# 3. Purpose and Objective of Baseline Study:

The purpose of this Study is to derive the baseline status of the Program Models implemented through Life Stage wise interventions by the Local Partners with ChildFund India for the next three years. The study shall also capture implementation strategies and document the lessons learnt. The purpose of this baseline study is to provide an information base against which to monitor and assess the projects' progress and effectiveness during implementation and after the activity is completed. Target audience for the report is for ChildFund and to be externally shared with their present and potential donors, government agencies, international development cooperation, civil society and technical partner agencies.

### 4. Methodology:

The agency will adopt a mix of Quantitative and Qualitative methods to design the tools on selected indicators pertaining to the thematic interventions across three Life Stages. The team will administer Household Survey with the target population, Village Profiling, In-Depth Interview with government officials in sample locations.

Baseline sample locations will be selected from among 12 locations and 9 partners implementing their programmes in the East Zone as detailed below.

- 80 % Parents/Caregivers in 14 communities across 9 States effectively interact with Government service providers and demand ICDS/ICPS services for their IYC.
- 60% of Parents/Caregivers engage in sustainable and gainful livelihood (IGA).

# LS2 Program PENCIL Model (Protective, Effective N Context based Initiation of Learning)

- 60% of children aged 6 years in 200 communities across 12 States have school readiness.
- 75 % of children in 260 target schools and 650 communities from 30 districts across 14 States have access to age appropriate quality learning environment within their school and community.
- 85 % of children in 650 villages from 30 districts across 14 States establish positive relationships with parents, teachers and peers for shared and supportive learning.
- 50,000 Children grow in a violence-free culture and environment within their own families, and within the 650 villages and 300 schools across 12 states.

# LS3 Program 3E Model (Employment, Entrepreneurship, Empowerment)

• 80% of the trained youth (80% ChildFund enrolled youth, and 20% non-enrolled) earn living/ wage by engaging in safe, non-exploitative and sustainable jobs.

- 80% of ChildFund India trained youth (80% ChildFund enrolled youth) earn consistent income by engaging in safe and sustainable livelihood activities (IGAs and small businesses).
- 80% of youth in more than 80% of ChildFund program communities engage and lead community development and civic works, through their collectives within the community and beyond.

# **Child Protection**

- 60 % adolescents and youth in 17 communities across 9 states have comprehensive, correct and appropriate knowledge on Sexual and Reproductive Health.
- 50 % adolescents and youth in 17 communities across 9 states adopt safe and healthy practices pertaining to sexuality and reproduction.
- 40 % adolescents and youth in 17 communities across 9 states have increased access to adolescent-friendly counselling and services.
- 60% of our program communities in 15 states have active child protection committees.
